Cheese and Bacon Swirls

INGREDIENTS

- 1 pack all butter puff pastry
- 5 back bacon rashers, sliced into 1cm strips
- 3/4 tub cream cheese
- 75g cheddar, grated
- 1 onion, diced
- handful of parsley, chopped
- salt & pepper to season
- 1 egg, beaten
- Pre-heat oven to 180C. Line a baking sheet with baking paper. 1.
- Roll out the puff pastry and spread cream cheese all over the surface. I cut the pastry roll in half and 2. got 2 lots made.
- Sprinkle evenly all over with cheddar, onion, bacon rashers, parsley and season with salt and pepper. 3.
- Then roll up one end until you've made a swiss roll. 4.
- Using a sharp knife, slice up into 10 segments and place on the baking tray. Brush over with egg 5. wash.
- Bake for about 20 25 minutes until golden 6.

(NC)—Canadian gardeners are discovering that coffee grounds offer a valuable source of nutrition for gardens.

Coffee grounds can be used in several ways. Grounds can be applied along with other materials as a side dressing for vegetables, roses, and other plants. They also make an excellent addition to the compost. Grounds can also help with worm bins. Worms fed with coffee grounds will flourish.

Gardeners can use grounds from their home coffee brewing machines, or they can stop by Starbucks to pick up a bag of complimentary coffee grounds. Starbucks offers spent grounds to customers year-round for use in gardens and compost bins.

"Coffee grounds can be a valuable source of nutrition for the garden," says Ben Packard, director of Environmental Affairs for Starbucks. "Reusing coffee grounds in the garden year-round is a great way to avoid disposing of this rich resource from our stores."

According to The Composting Council of Canada, composting not only helps to reduce the amount of waste going to landfills, it produces a valuable soil amendment that can improve the texture and fertility of the soil.

Compost is the single most important ingredient for soil quality and productivity.



Some gardeners even use the grounds to help ward off slugs and snails. The grounds can be used to mulch plants that slugs love to feast on, such as hostas, ligularias and lilies.

Coffee grounds can be applied directly to a garden's acid loving plants such as azaleas, roses or hydrangeas. While coffee grounds may be acidic, adding leaves and dried grass can reduce this acidity. Your local gardening expert can help you decide what is best for your garden.

LCIF News John Benefield

Each year, more than 300,000 children are diagnosed with cancer globally. This means that a child is diagnosed with cancer every 2 minutes.

Globally, 37% of children with cancer survive, but survival rates vary widely by region. In 2018, the World Health Organization launched the Global Initiative for Childhood Cancer with the goal of reaching at least 60% survival rate for children with cancer by 2030. The Initiative brings together stakeholders from around the world and across sectors towards the common goal. LCIF has begun working with the Initiative to explore new ways in which Lions can help children with cancer in their communities.

Our Strategy

Grants are available to Lions districts and multiple districts in amounts from US\$10,000 to US\$150,000. Projects must be implemented in coordination or collaboration with existing government or charitable childhood cancer medical facilities.

Examples

Project examples include but are not limited to:

- Construction, expansion, or renovation of child, teenager, and family-friendly waiting rooms in healthcare facilities
- Construction, expansion, or renovation of rooms or houses where families can rest, sleep, or cook meals while their child is receiving treatment
- Projects that strengthen access to or improve transportation to and from medical appointments
- Projects that address the educational and recreational needs of childhood cancer patients receiving treatment at a healthcare facility
- Infrastructure to support palliative care

Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) and Global HOPE® are pleased to announce a new partnership to improve childhood cancer survival rates in sub-Saharan Africa. Nearly 80% of children with cancer live in low- or middle-income countries where, tragically, only 10% of children survive cancer. In higher income countries such as Canada, Japan, and the United States, more than 80% of children with cancer survive. The good news is the world can be more successful at curing cancer in children. However, much work needs to be done to improve access to drugs and treatment, train healthcare providers, improve facilities and technology, and address socio-cultural barriers to improve global survival rates.

Launched in 2017, Global HOPE is a transformational initiative that is improving the standard of care for children with cancer. In May 2019, the LCIF Board of Trustees approved a two-year strategic partnership in order to build long-term capacity in Africa to treat and dramatically improve the prognosis for children. This partnership will strengthen the local healthcare infrastructure to effectively provide the multi-disciplinary care that is needed to care for children with cancer and blood disorders.

The partnership includes three components:

- LCIF funding support of US\$2 million over two years to support development of infrastructure at Global HOPE's centres of excellence
- Engagement of local Lions in Global HOPE activities at the country level
- Joint fundraising to expand the project impact through the addition of new partners

DID YOU KNOW.....



Why is Christmas abbreviated "Xmas"? Because the Greek letter "x" is the first letter of the Greek word for Christ, Xristos. "Xmas therefore means "Christ's Mass". It's been around since at least the sixteenth century and is not an attempt to take the "Christ" out of "Christmas" and make it a secular holiday

Why is it a custom to kiss under the mistletoe? It may be related to a Scandinavian goddess. Frigga, the goddess of love in Norse mythology, is strongly associated with mistletoe, which has been used a decoration in homes for thousands of years. Mistletoe is associated with many pagan rituals. In fact, the Christian church disliked the plant so much, that it forbade its use in any form. Some English churches continued this ban as late as the 20th century! According to Charles Panati's book, holly became a Christian substitute for mistletoe, which is why we "deck the halls" with it. The leaves representing the thorns in Christ's crown and the berries his blood.

Why we decorate trees for Christmas? The evergreen tree, because it is perpetually green, has been used a symbol of eternal life since the ancient Egyptians and Hebrews. The Scandinavians believed that th4e evergreen tree in honour of Xmas became popular in the Middle Ages, especially in Germany. The decorations then consisted of candles and wafers, to symbolize Christ and the Host. Martin Luther is actually said to be the first person to put candles on a tree. The decorated wooden Xmas pyramid was also popular then. The tree became popular in Europe and America in the 18th century and the Victorians started decorating them with candles and cakes hung with ribbon. Woolworths began selling manufactured Xmas ornaments in 1880 and the custom became big very fast. The first electronically lighted Xmas tree appeared in 1882.

What about the history of the Christmas Cake? What we now know as Christmas Cake was originally a Scottish splendour called Twelfth Night Cake. A very rich fruit cake, almost solid with fruit, almonds, and spices, the ingredients



were bound together with plenty of good Scotch Whisky. The stiff mixture was put into a cake tin lined with a rich short pastry and baked. This splendid confection took the place of the even more ancient sun cakes. A legacy of Scotland's associations with Scandinavia, sun cakes were baked with a hole in the centre and symmetrical lines around, representing the sun's rays. This is the pattern now found on Scottish shortbread.
