The Duffy Books program was designed to create and enhance the desire for children to read through book ownership and the philosophy behind the program is simple – to break the cycle of "booklessness".

To that end, the Duffy Book program provides children with books that they can take home and read and own. Our Lions Club donated \$2500 to Mayfield School to enable them to benefit from this enormously important program for lower decile schools.

On December 4, it was a real pleasure to attend the Mayfield School assembly with President Delphine, Neville (a former Mayfield Headmaster) and Charles (our erstwhile photographer), to finally present our donation to the school. 
From The Wood Site
