

All registered charities must file an annual return, which includes a form and a performance report or financial statements, within six months of their balance date. If you are unsure about your charity's balance date or whether you are up-to-date with annual returns, you can search for your charity on Charities Register.

Over the next few weeks you may receive one or more emails in succession that would have usually been sent over the previous 2 months. You will likely see one or more of the following:

- If, during this time, you have passed your balance date (the last date of your financial year), you will receive an email with a reminder to begin the preparation of your accounts.
- If it has been 3 months since your balance date, you may receive a reminder to complete your accounts.
- If it has been 6 months since your balance date, you may receive an email that says these accounts are now overdue.

If your charity's annual return is due shortly, but you won't be able to file your documents on time, you can ask for an extension call 0508 242748




Did any 202E club take up the eye glass collection from Ferrymead Lions?

Good Lions Stories Hillary Outdoor Programme Malvern Lions Club

Recently, Louis Ridgen, Rory Perrin and I travelled to Great Barrier Island to take part in the Hillary Outdoors programme: an exciting, challenging five-day adventure. This fabulous opportunity was provided to us by the Malvern Lions Club, who provide three scholarships perseverance and are keen to build and develop leadership skills through a range of mentally and physically challenging activities. We flew from Christchurch to Auckland, and then on to Great Barrier Island on a little charter plane. The flight took 40 minutes and the views were amazing. Finally, we had an hour's van drive to the Hillary Outdoors Centre, where we were warmly welcomed by

we were warmly welcomed by our instructors.

Over the course of the five days, we did many challenging and adrenaline-pumping activities, including rock climbing, snorkelling, via faratta (cliff walking), paddle boarding, coastering, sea kayaking, waka, river adventures, high ropes course and an overnight expedition. My favourite activity was coastering on another island. To get there we had to sea kayak for seven kilometres.

Then we headed around the side of the island, walking on cliffs

that hung over the water, trying not to slip onto barnacles and waiting for the right moment to jump from rock to rock—the swell

to support each other to make the two massive cliff jumps. This activity pushed a lot of people out of their comfort zone but, by the end of it, we learnt to trust ourselves and the instructors.



By the end of the programme, everyone knew each other well and some amazing friendships had been made within the group of around twenty people, from Years New Zealand.

We were joined by many past members, Lions from Christchurch City Breakfast, Wigram Skies, Picton, Blenheim and our Nelson region clubs, for this "once in a lifetime" event for our members. I had a little voice in my head saying Lions International will have you thinking we are a new club.....yet we have officially been in the Lions family since 10th June 1983. We will not diminish those 38 years of hard graft and spectacular deeds done by these wonderful ladies and those before them who have contributed to and continue to contribute to our community. Add to the history lesson, under the brilliant guidance of Yvonne Pitman back on 10th June 1983 the Lioness Club of Nelson was born with a membership of an amazing 43 ladies. During the following 38 years, we have donated a whopping \$700,000 odd dollars in the name of Lioness and Lions.

In 1975 saw the first Lioness club formed in North Carolina USA. A good Lioness club has many purposes; friendship, fellowship and enjoyment through services to the community and a creative use of time with the essence being service to others.

These ladies have guided us very successfully and continue to be the matriarchs of our little group.

Do I have an aspiration for the future? Well of course I do – I want to walk beside and with these ladies while they strive to achieve their hearts desire when "serving" our community and to make sure that everything we do is always filled with fellowship, fun, laughter and enjoyment. 

We had 19 Seaward Lions there either helping or walking or both.


We raised a total of \$835.80 for Bowel Cancer NZ! Approximately 72 people walked a total of 233 laps. That's a total distance of 277.27 km.
