

Responding to a Need

Three quarters of these children live in the most underserved regions of Asia and Africa, where there is a lack of access to treatment for preventable or treatable conditions. NATIONAL COLLECTIVE OF INDEPENDENT WOMEN'S REFUGES INC. Nad Whare Whakaruruhau o Aotearoa

We are a women's organisation for women and their children, here to help prevent and stop family violence in New Zealand.

If you are experiencing any form of abuse in your family or your relationship, or know someone who is, there are many ways we can help you – for free, and confidentially.

We'd love to help whether you have children or not. Women's Refuge can: talk to you if you're worried about your safety in your relationship and help you make a Safety Plan

provide a safe place to go to if you need help urgently help you stand up for your needs whether or not you are thinking about leaving.

We are an independent, bicultural community organisation and have support services designed especially for children, young people, Māori women, Pasifika women and migrant and refugee women. We also assist lesbian women, older women and women with disabilities.

Domestic violence is a pervasive, life-threatening crime that impacts on thousands of New Zealanders with serious physical, psychological and economic effects.

Crime and injury statistics show how significant a problem domestic violence is in our country. It is one of the leading causes of injury and death to women, and also leads to short and long-term health problems such as mental illness, and problems with sexual and reproductive health.

Dr Fanslow says the most worrying aspect is that intimate partner violence, even if it occurred in the past, is significantly associated with present physical and mental health problems including depression, sleep problems and suicide attempts.

The economic cost of domestic violence on the individual, family, community and country as a whole is considerable. For example, in 1996 economist Suzanne Snively estimated the cost of domestic violence in New Zealand to be between \$1.2 and \$5.8 billion per annum. In today's terms, that's up to about \$8 billion each year.

New Zealand domestic violence statistics

One in three women experience psychological or physical abuse from their partners in their lifetime On average 14 women, six men and 10 children are killed by a member of their family every year Police are called to around 200 domestic violence situations a day – that's one every seven minutes on average

Police estimate only 18% of domestic violence incidents are reported

At least 74,785 children and young people aged under 17 were present at domestic violence situations attended by police 84% of those arrested for domestic violence are men; 16% are women

For most New Zealanders, when we need an escape we simply jump online and book a getaway. But for some that isn't an option. Every night in this country, over 167 women and children are too afraid to stay at home because of family violence. Women's Refuge is able to provide them with a safe place to stay, but it's becoming increasingly difficult to meet the financial needs of this essential service.

We undertake original research projects on domestic violence issues in New Zealand.

Domestic violence impacts on a number of sectors. These include housing, employment, welfare, police, education, disability issues, drugs and alcohol, health, corrections and the justice sector.

Our research investigates domestic violence and issues related to these sectors. On an ad hoc basis, we undertake various projects to help us find ways to improve the safety and well being of New Zealand women and children.

Here is the current research that Women's Refuge has undertaken.

Kids in the Middle

Women's Refuge has released a first of its kind research report into what children need to feel safe after family violence. Nineteen children aged 5-13 were interviewed by specialist researchers about their experiences of finding safety and support. All of the kids that took part in the research were forthcoming with their thoughts, feelings, and memories of being in Women's Refuge safe houses or programmes. The children's reflections of their time at Refuge prompted us to think differently about how kids cope with the aftermath of violence.

Intimate Partner Stalking

Women's Refuge has released research that examines stalking in the context of an intimate partner relationship or intimate partner stalking (IPS). Over 700 respondents answered the survey and the research also looked at Women's Refuge internal statistics and found that stalking was part of the pattern of violence for over 70% of our client pre-separation, and over 60% post-separation.

Pet Abuse Report

For many women living with intimate partners who use abuse to exercise power and control over them, animals represent both a source of comfort and a source of vulnerability. Pets and farm animals can represent some of the most meaningful relationships in victims' lives, and for many, these constitute family relationships. Unfortunately, many victims are forced to bear witness to the same brutality towards their pets that they are subjected to themselves, as the person who abuses them also threatens, frightens, harms, and even kills the animals that they care for.

Reproductive Coercion

Reproductive coercion is a form of Intimate Partner Violence (IVP) that involves controlling access and tampering with contraceptives, pregnancy coercion, attempting to cause miscarriage, and intentional exposure to sexually transmitted infections (STIs). The study also looked at partner behaviours during different points of pregnancy and around the termination of a pregnancy. In addition it addressed the monitoring of sexuality as a form of control, and as a way to facilitate reproductive coercion. Economic abuse report

In recognition of the minimal available literature on economic abuse in the context of intimate partner violence, Women's Refuge conducted a survey of 445 women who considered themselves to have been victims or potential victims of economic abuse by partners. The aim of this research was to explore women's experiences of being victimised through economic abuse, and in particular, how this impacted their social, employment, and housing situations.

Matariki - the Māori New Year - 2 JULY 2021

Matariki is the Māori name for the star cluster known as the Pleiades. Traditionally for Māori when it appeared just before dawn in late May or early June, it signalled the start of the Māori New Year. For some tribes, the rising of Puanga (Rigel in Orion) signals the start of the New Year. In the early

2000s Te Taura Whiri i te Reo Māori (Māori Language Commission), the Ministry of Education and the Museum of New Zealand Te Papa Tongarewa, became involved in the revival of Matariki celebrations.

When is Matariki?

Different tribes celebrated Matariki at different times. For some it was when Matariki rose in May/June. For others it was celebrated at the first new moon, or full moon, following the rising of Matariki. In the 21st century it is the new moon following the rising of Matariki that signals the New Year.

For many iwi the appearance of Puanga (Rigel in Orion) in the night sky signalled the start of winter.

Puanga was said to be one of the parents of the climbing plant puawānanga.

Matariki is officially celebrated on 6 June 2016. Celebrations can last up to 3 days.

What does Matariki mean?

Matariki has two meanings, both of which refer to the cluster of stars. Mata Riki means Tiny Eyes, and Mata Ariki means Eyes of God. The Matariki new moon happens sometime in June.

Why is Matariki important?

In years gone by, Matariki was thought to determine your crop for the coming season, and therefore it was important to recognise the part it played in nature's cycle. The disappearance of Matariki in Autumn, signaled the time to gather and preserve crops, and so was an important marker in the harvest calender. Nowadays, Matariki is seen as an important time to celebrate the earth, and show respect for the land on which we live.

How is Matariki celebrated?

Traditionally Matariki was celebrated by gathering with whanau (family) and reflecting on the past. The festival's connection to the stars provided an opportunity for families to remember their whakapapa (genealogy) and those ancestors who had passed away to the heavens. Offerings were made to land-based gods who would help provide good crops, and new trees were planted to signal new beginnings.

The Prime Minister says June 24 will be a public holiday in 2022 to celebrate Ngā Mata o te Ariki, more commonly known as Matariki, which traditionally heralds the start of a new year for Māori.

The Government has also asked the Matariki Advisory Group to advise on future dates, as the exact timing of Matariki shifts each year, but these are expected to always fall on a Monday or Friday.

"Matariki will be a distinctly New Zealand holiday; a time for reflection and celebration, and our first public holiday that recognises Te Ao Māori," Ardern said in her speech at Waitangi's upper marae on Thursday. "It's great to have the date locked in for next year. This will be a day to acknowledge our nation's unique, shared identity, and the importance of tikanga Māori. It's going to be something very special, and something uniquely New Zealand," she said.

"It will also break up the lag between public holidays that currently exists between Queen's Birthday in early June and Labour Day in late October."
