




The Lions Clubs New Zealand Child Mobility Foundation

KAIKOURA HIGH SCHOOL 50 YEARS ON

Recollections of a new teacher at the Form 1 to 7 High School 1971

With my dear wife Jenny and our 3 month old baby in tow, we had arrived bushy tailed and innocent in Kaikoura, fresh from 3 years of High School teaching in Australia. School house in Churchill Street. That was good. The Dravitskis were leaving and I had a good conversation with Peter about the school, especially science. With eyes drawn through the window to the impressive mountain scene, that was a topic too, mostly about the best climbing route to Manakau. I met the new Principal, Ross Nelson. He seemed like a good sort and later, at a very crowded Adelphi Hotel, I met down to earth Gough Wilson, continuing as teacher in the (Technical) Woodwork department.



In fits and starts I met the other staff, Chris Ulrich, Deputy Principal, Beryl Evans, Senior Mistress, Eric Freemantle, Brian Tegg, Adrienne Barnett, Colleen Brocker, Michael Kidson, Keith Dunlop and a someone Young and Richardson, whose Christian names escape me. Along with them were part timers Sue McInnes, Margaret Tegg, Jennifer Venz and Michael Kidson's wife and Ken Graham. The most important person in the school, the office assistant, was Mrs Winskill and Peg Fowlie was the Librarian. Pedro Dickson, record holder for catching Butterfish, was the Caretaker and Groundsman. Of that list, I'm the only local full time survivor, along with part timers Jennifer Rodokal and Sue McInnes.

So that made up the crew, overseeing a large, mixed bunch of students, who gathered together on a warm February day in 1971, all of us beginning life as a brand new Form 1 to 7 High School at the "old" site of the Kaikoura Primary School. What was life for me at the time as a new teacher at the school? In a word, daunting, but hey, I was 27. I could do anything! The list of what I was asked to teach was long—nearly all the Phys Ed in the school, Science to all levels up to School Certificate, Sportsmaster (Swimming Sports in another 2 weeks!!). At one stage I was asked to teach senior Science because no other teacher was available. Did I say daunting! The fact I'd only ever taught Phys Ed or that I was unfamiliar with New Zealand curricula wasn't helpful either, but, thank heavens, Western Science is handily universal and Phys Ed is Phys Ed everywhere and enthusiasm and energy carried the day and I survived! How does that compare with the present?

And the kids? What a collection! Think Kaikoura 1971 here, long before Whalewatch and mass tourism. Sons and daughters of Ministry of Works staff, Railway workers, farmers, fishermen, shopkeepers, nondescript townies, etc. First impressions of the students were a friendly sea of faces, happy go lucky, sports mad and, dare I say it, non academic. They had no great aspirations to be movers and shakers. Of course I generalise and we've all seen kids come from Kaikoura High School with wonderful achievements in their chosen fields, inevitably the product of good family upbringing and personal motivation. These attributes are winners everywhere.

Our new high school was in name only in 1971, as mentioned, still on the site of the Primary School in Torquay Street. The plan at the time was for the Primary School to shift to Hastings Street, leading to the redevelopment of the high school site, but as we all know, the high school did the shifting, opening on Rorrisons Road in 1979, so it took a while.





Here we are 50 years on. What a great little school KHS has been for so many students over those years. I can identify with an article from the last Kaikoura District High School magazine, 1970, by student, Dennise Greathead, writing about the benefits of small schools versus big schools. She relished the contact between the different year levels, knowing just about everyone, the closer contact between teachers and students. When everything works well, one big happy family.

Ideally, the high school, like the other schools, are the heart of the community. As a "slightly" older teacher, it's great to be part of a smallish rural community where I can see so many still-happy faces from all those years ago whenever I'm around the town. The school reflected in the community.

The cemetery project went well - Barry

The following were along for the second Working Bee. Rusty (for a bit), Bob E, Alan G, Peter Mc, Darryl Mc, Paul R and I.

We had the digger with two from Delta for 3 hours and needed the whole time. The tree pruning/removal took a little less time, but all round you could count it as 7 x 3 = 21 man hours for the project. I forgot my phone for photos but Darryl came to the rescue with a record shot. Delta thanked by email for the digger donation. Barry thanked Mike Russell of KDC. All together a very pleasing result for the project. A lot of headstones/monument work replaced/tidied, including quite a bit fallen onto pathways between graves or onto adjacent graves. The community should be well pleased with the result and hopes are an article might be composed for the Kaikoura Star.
