GO BACK AN HOUR BEFORE BED

History of daylight saving in NZ

NZ first introduced daylight saving time in 1927. The current times have been fixed since 2007.

 $1868 - \mathrm{NZ}$ officially set a national standard time - called NZ Mean Time - at 11 hours and 30 minutes ahead of Greenwich Mean Time (GMT).

1927 — NZ first observed daylight saving time. The dates and time difference were changed several times over the following years.
1941 — NZ summer time was extended by emergency regulations

to cover the whole year. 1946 — NZ summer time (12 hours in advance of GMT) was

adopted as New Zealand standard time. Daylight saving time was

effectively discontinued at this point.

1974–5 — Daylight saving was trialled again in 1974, and introduced in 1975. Daylight saving time is 1 hour ahead of NZ standard time.

1985 — Public attitudes were surveyed and over the next few years the period of daylight saving time was extended twice.

2006-07 — Following public debate and a petition presented to Parliament the period of daylight saving was extended to its current dates. New Zealand observes daylight saving from the last Sunday in September to the first Sunday in April.

HAPPY EASTER TO EVERYONE - ENJOY TIME WITH FAMILY & FRIENDS



In 2024, Easter Sunday will New Zealand and around the world. Easter Sunday is an important day for Christians as it commemorates the day Jesus was resurrected from the dead after he was crucified on the Friday. Why does Easter change dates every year and what's allowed to open?

The date of Easter, changes from year to year. The reason for this variation is that Easter always falls on the first Sunday after the first full moon following the spring equinox. Easter is quite similar to other major holidays like Christmas and Halloween, which have evolved over the last 200 years or so. In all of these holidays, Christian and non-Christian (pagan) elements have continued to blend together.

The very strange history of the Easter Bunny



While you're biting the heads off your chocolate bunnies this weekend, you might wonder how cartoon rabbits became so central to our Easter celebrations. It's tempting to assume that because there's no biblical basis for the Easter Bunny, rabbits and hares have no religious significance – but that's just not the case. Leviticus 11:6 states that the hare is an unclean animal: "The hare, for even though it chews the cud, it does not have divided hoofs; it is unclean for you", but in Christian art, it is regularly associated with rebirth and resurrection. In fact, the

symbol of a circle of three hares joined by their ears has been found in a number of churches in Devon. Like much of our cultural "bunny" symbolism, the meaning of this image remains mysterious – and The Three Hares Project has been set up to research and document occurrences of the ancient symbol, examples of which have been found as far away as China. Rabbits and hares have also been associated with Mary, mother of Jesus, for centuries. Their association with virgin birth comes from the fact that hares – often conflated mistakenly with rabbits – are able to produce a second litter of offspring while still pregnant with the first.

ANZAC DAY - 25 APRIL 2024

Anzac Day is a day on which people commemorate the contributions of the Australian and New Zealand armed forces. It marks the anniversary of the first major military action fought by Australian and New Zealand forces during the First World War.

ANZAC stands for Australian and New Zealand Army Corps, and the soldiers in these services are often referred to as Anzac

Anzac Day is held every year on the 25th of April. This date is deliberately chosen to mark the anniversary of the Gallipoli Peninsula landings.

Memorial services take place across New Zealand and Australia. There are also events held at the site of the landings in Turkey.



In New Zealand and Australia, the day is a public holiday. As the 25th of April is a Sunday this year, the following day (Monday 26th April) has now been declared a national holiday. Anzac Day commemorations began in New Zealand in 1916, only a year after the landings. Then it was only a half-day holiday. It became a full day in 1921.

Australia was a little later to mark the occasion, but by 1927, every Australian state held some kind of memorial ceremony on the 25th of April.

Earth Day is an annual event on April 22 to demonstrate support for environmental protection. First held on April 22, 1970, it now includes a wide range of events coordinated globally by Earthday.org including 1 billion people in more than 193 countries. The official theme for 2024 is "Planet vs. Plastics."

For Earth Day 2024 on April 22nd, EARTHDAY.ORG is unwavering in our commitment to end plastics for the sake of human and planetary health, demanding a 60% reduction in the production of **ALL** plastics by 2040.

THE ORIGINS OF EARTH DAY

In the decades leading up to the first, Americans were consuming vast amounts of leaded gas through massive and inefficient automobiles. Industry belched out smoke and sludge with little fear of the consequences from either the law or bad press. Air pollution was commonly accepted as the smell of prosperity. Until this point, mainstream America remained largely oblivious to environmental concerns and how a polluted environment threatens human health.

However, the stage was set for change with the publication of Rachel Carson's New York Times bestseller Silent Spring in 1962. The book represented a watershed moment, selling more than 500,000 copies in 24 countries as it raised public awareness and concern for living organisms, the environment and the inextricable links between pollution and public health.

Did you know..

From July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2023, more than 530 million people were helped by Lions worldwide. This is an increase of more than six million people served over the previous year, thanks to the unwavering commitment of the more than 1.4 million Lions around the world.

Lions engaged in more 1.5 million service projects over the past year, an 11 percent increase over the year prior.

These include:

Awarded more than 1,400 LCIF grants that supported communities and more than 17 million people globally.

Assisted over 33 million people by reducing the prevalence of diabetes and improving the quality of life for those diagnosed.
