### **District Convention:**

This is coming up very soon! As has been said before, this is the opportunity for clubs to have their say in matters concerning the district as a whole, e.g. the election of our new leaders and district representatives on national Trusts, etc. Make sure your club has identified and chosen the number of delegates it is entitled to (1 delegate for every 10 club members), and make sure they have registered for Convention, along with any others from your clubs who are intending to go but have not yet registered. See the Convention info in another part of this Bulletin. Look forward to seeing you there!

### New Leaders:

Speaking of choosing District leaders, it is also now time to be lining up our club leaders for 2025-2026. Whether new leaders are coming into some positions, or your existing leaders are carrying on, we need to be nominating these, presenting them to the club, and completing voting throughout March so that the elected members are registered with Lions International during April. Note that the role of a Marketing and Communications Leader is now an official position on your Club Board of Directors and many clubs are also including a Membership Chair on their Board as well. It is strongly recommended that each club elects someone to each of these roles for this coming Lions year, so that new members can be attracted through club publicity and put forward for membership with support from the team.

### Learning Opportunities:

As we know, new leaders do not necessarily come "ready-made" – they each develop in their role as time goes by, and with the help and support of others with leadership experience. This is why we run our very popular Club Leaders' Workshops, where there is sharing of experience and new ideas to give confidence to club leaders at all stages of their leadership pathway.

By the time this Bulletin goes to print, many club members will have benefited from the series of "Revive, Revitalise!" forums around the district during March. While these have been mainly focussed on Marketing, Membership and the link between the two, they have provided those attending with a variety of new ideas and activities to take back to their clubs. It may be possible to incorporate some of these ideas into the Club Officers' Workshops as well. See elsewhere in the Bulletin for some preliminary information about these Club Officers' workshops.

### Events:

I have been privileged to take part in a number of events around the District over the past month, and further afield to other Districts' Conventions. All of these events reinforce for me the amazing things being done by Lions all around our country, and beyond.

One of the most recent was a Fundraiser Banquet and Auction, hosted by the Christchurch Chinese Club, to raise funds for the Lions Skin Cancer Screening bus which is being launched at our District Convention in Hanmer (see elsewhere in this Bulletin).

Delicious food and a very well-supported auction, altogether made a total of \$22K, thanks to the amazing generosity of the ChCh Chinese club and all their invited guests.

## Emerging Lions Leadership Institute (ELLI) 2025 - one 202E Lion's Feedback.

The ELLI course was held from 17 th – 19 th January at the Redwood Hotel Christchurch. This fast-paced programme meant I had to do some preparation before I attended. It was a very robust and interesting course, which was well attended, with people coming from as far away as Kaitaia and Timaru.

We learnt about the fundamentals of Lionism. We did a unit on "Change Management" and how to bring about change in Lions clubs and of course this is to help increase membership. Engagement was through lots of fun activities used by the facilitators. They helped us to learn important ideas about Team Leadership and Mentoring at the club level. We had to design a presentation to show our understanding of the role of LCIF in Lions. My group did Disaster Relief. I did the Kaikoura earthquake while someone else did Cyclone Gabrielle and another group member did the Christchurch earthquake. It was a very touching presentation, and we all learned heaps about the different grants that are available.

Another highlight was the unit on Communication and Listening skills. Being a good listener is key to developing good people relationships at the club level. I've been up-skilled by using new and effective strategies for meeting management.

Finally, not only did I meet and enjoy the company of like-minded Lions, who like me, thoroughly enjoyed every aspect of the course, but the tutors were motivating and made the course fun and interesting. So later this year when the opportunity arises, I'd like to see some of you put your name forward for the ELLI Course next year.

Every year each District, Multiple District, Regional Area and Lions Clubs International hold a convention. Our 202E Convention will take place from Friday, March 28 to Sunday, March 30 at the Hanmer Springs Hotel, Hanmer Springs and will include: <u>Flag Ceremony</u>: recognises the roots of Lionism and the historical associations built up since the beginning in 1917.

It allows us to acknowledge the Lions from Countries other than our own who have a common goal with us as Lions. <u>Annual General Meeting:</u> You will hear reports on the prior year's financial results, the different Lions focus areas and have an opportunity to consider and examine new proposals. Any Lions Member in good standing may attend and vote if they are a delegate of their club. Other Lions Members may attend the Annual General Meeting and even if they do not have a vote, they have speaking rights at the meeting. Lions Members are encouraged to attend all aspects of the convention.

Saturday evening function: Lions believe that they cannot get so bogged down with work that they miss the social aspect of Lionism. People who play together stay together. The Theme: "After The Climb".

**Rededication Service:** This time allows us to honour those Lions who have passed away since the last convention and remember their very valuable contribution. Most of us have very special memories of the person or persons and to take a moment to recognise them for what they have meant to us as individuals or as club members is a very special and moving time. It also serves the purpose of rethinking why we are Lions and in what direction we would like to see the District progress in the coming year. Will you be there?

- A brief summary from Life Flight recently reads:
- Last year, Life Flight provided life-saving emergency air services to 1,641 patients across New Zealand, marking a 28% increase in demand in 18 months.

- The emergencies responded to include heart attacks, strokes, neurosurgery, cancer, burns, spinal injuries, premature births, and the care of critically ill children.
