



On what was arguably the coldest, wettest morning so far this year, nine hardy, (or slightly crazy) members of the Environment Committee, assisted by four members of the community, enlisted by Toni's post on the Kaikoura Notice Board, headed out to South Bay to carry out another Litter Intelligence Survey.

As in the past, the group has a set area to survey and record every seaborne piece of litter they find. The table on the left shows just what they found. They found twice as many pieces of litter than in the last survey.

There are now 54 fewer items of litter in the area, with a total weight of 382 grams. This might not seem very much, but the area is only 100 m x 20 m which is small. Imagine just how many pieces of little would be found on the whole beach.

By the time they had finished, the group were soaked to the skin and frozen to the bone, but satisfied that the beach is just that tiny bit cleaner!


The Many Uses of the WWW to help our Club

I'm always trying to find new ways to keep this bulletin looking better.

There are many applications and programs available to everyone which I have been experimenting with. The first was CANVA, a graphic designing program. As we are a non-profit organisation it is available free to use, and up to 50 members of our club may access it. I use it to make the birthday greetings page. We also use it to do the covers of the bulletin and programmes for events. A great resource.

Another way the WWW can help is by using an AI application. If I want to send a report and am stuck for words, I can input some notes, and the app will give me several ways I could write the report. Once again, this is available to us all and can make our lives much easier. (In case you are worried, AI only answers the questions you input.)

There is a website called "Cool Lions Graphics" on which members can post graphics about Lions. If you have an event you wish to advertise you can ask for graphics advertising it. For example, if I am organising a barbecue I could ask for Lions barbecue, and members from all over the world can post graphics advertising Lions manning a barbecue. A great resource.

174 Lions from District 202E gathered at the Hanmer Hotel for the 55th convention of our district. The convention began on Friday evening with the Hurunui District Mayor, Marie Black welcoming everyone to the district and telling us all a little of the history of the area.

After her welcome, the traditional Flag Ceremony took place. 17 Flags were carried in by pupils of Hanmer School. They represented the countries of Constitutional Area 7, our area, and flags representing the other Constitutional Areas around the world. A power point highlighted the work of LCIF throughout the world in tackling the eight Global Causes we support. The guest speaker for the evening was PCC Megan England, who spoke about the 'new' mountain she is climbing now that she is retired and the challenges she faces in this new chapter in her life. Her message to us all was to not worry about the fact that the summit is so far away, but to keep moving ahead one step at a time.

Saturday's business session, chaired by DG Pam Harvey, went smoothly and all new office holders were confirmed by the voting delegates. Following this session, we all went outside for the launch of the newest Lions NZ project, the Skin Cancer Screening Vehicle. This project which was conceived six years ago by PDG Paul O'Connor, chair of the Lions Clubs Cancer Trust, has finally come to fruition with the launch of the first of two buses which will cover the small towns and areas around New Zealand offering FREE skin cancer screening for everyone. The bus has all the equipment necessary to carry out full body scans and will be life changing for many people. With the Lions logos proudly displayed on the bus along with those of all the generous sponsors, it will become the best moving billboard for our organisation.

When PDG John Bilderbeck presented the District Awards for his year, Kaikoura Seaward's Lou Smith won the award for the Best District Bulletin, not for the first time, and received a DG's certificate of appreciation for her support. Seaward also received a Club Excellence Award.

The dinner and dance on Saturday night was the usual fun event, as you will see from the photos. Much hilarity ensued and there were a few very quiet people at the service on Sunday morning.
