Lions clubs throughout the world have a strong association with the Special Olympics. Here are some interesting facts about what has been achieved:

- * US\$28 million has been given to the Special Olympics since 2001 for activities that include Opening Eyes, Family Health Forums, Healthy Hearing, Special Smiles and inclusive sports.
- * 455,000+ Special Olympics athletes have received free vision screenings through the Opening Eyes program.
- * 194,000+ Special Olympics athletes have received free prescription eveglasses at Opening Eyes events.
- * 22,000+ Lions have volunteered with Special Olympics since 2000.
- * 1,100+ Eye care professionals have volunteered their services.

The next New Zealand Special Olympics will be held in Christchurch during 10-14 December. A large contingent of Lions will be there to continue the legacy. We will be assisting at Opening Eyes, skin cancer screening and other places where help is needed.

A benefit of being part of a huge organization is collectively we can achieve huge results. Data such as what has been achieved at the Special Olympics is a result of what we report. Our main means of reporting is to use the Lion Portal to record every project and donation. Has your club entered all your projects and donations in the portal for this Lions year? cheers Neil

Selwyn Lions and Family helped plant 1,000 trees

Only 1% of original vegetation remains in the Selwyn region. Te Ara Kakariki (Greenway Canterbury) have developed a 'Greendot' programme to restore native habitats. Over 200,000 new plants has been planted across the region to date. A new native corridor is being established to link the mountains to the sea encouraging the birdlife to return. Our team of nine joined other volunteers successfully planting 600 native seedlings during the morning session. A further 400 were planted in the afternoon.

The World President AP Singh's LCIF Supporters Pins have finally arrived and as previously detailed, these are available for sale on behalf of LCIF. Cost being Bronze \$75, Silver \$150, Gold \$300. Please contact me should you wish to purchase a Pin/s. These Pins can provide an excellent means of acknowledging a Lion's special effort/or in recognition of one's Years of Service to Lions. Pins are issued annually in the name of that year's World president, so for those who are Collectors of Pins and Badges - these can form an ideal option to your collection base. Pins pertaining to recent World Presidents are also available.

One of my goals is to have all Clubs in 'ED' make a contribution to LCIF. There is no minimum \$ amount, but of course there is a goal of USD33000, and all the NZ Districts struggle to reach this figure. As a result our Area LCIF Leader - Tim

Irvine of W. Australia, is endeavouring to have LCIF reassess our goal - downwards of course.

For the first quarter 1 July to 30 Sept, only 6 clubs in our District donated to LCIF, I acknowledge that during this time, many of our clubs assisted by donating to the Tasman/Golden Bay floods.

One important aspect of all LCIF global donations, is that 100% of the amount donated is passed on to the recipients- in other words 'LCIF do no clip the ticket'. Below is a summary of our Lions' Global causes. In making contributions to LCIF your club can nominate which of the Causes you may wish to support.

LCIF, the Lions Clubs International Foundation, supports its global causes through grants and resources, which include Vision, Childhood Cancer, Hunger, Disaster Relief, Environment, Diabetes, Humanitarian Efforts, and Youth. These causes are areas where Lions Clubs focus their humanitarian service, both locally and globally.

- Vision: Supporting programs that prevent blindness and improve sight.
- **Childhood Cancer:** Assisting children and families affected by childhood cancer.
- **<u>Hunger:</u>** Fighting hunger and improving access to healthy food.
- Disaster Relief: Providing aid and support to communities impacted by natural disasters.
- **Environment:** Working to protect and restore the environment for community well-being.
- **<u>Diabetes:</u>** Raising awareness and supporting those affected by diabetes.
- Humanitarian Efforts: Funding service projects that address a wide range of community needs.
- Youth: Supporting programs that help youth develop leadership and life skills.

Leos Visit to Kaikoura - from the Marlborough Perspective.

The Marlborough contingent consisted of two Rai Valley Leos, two Marlborough Boys and three from Marlborough Girls Colleges.' Accompanying them were: Christine Hoggart and Debby Upsall. Kaikoura Lions had organised a working bee in South Bay clearing lupins off the beach, removing cover that predators, such as cats, use to creep up on the banded dotterels nesting. The Lions came equipped with all manner of chainsaws, secateurs and digging tools and the Leos dragged the lupins away as they were chopped off. The stumps were then painted with a poison to prevent their regrowth. It was hot, hard work taking nearly three hours to complete the job.







After a lunch break Tini led the Leos on a walk up the Kaikoura peninsula to visit the Hutton's Shearwater colony that has been established high on the hillside behind a predator proof fence. Ted Howard, a Lion as well as Chair of the Hutton's Shearwater Charitable Trust, generously allowed the Leos to enter the reserve and observe as he checked the nesting boxes. We were delighted to find several boxes already inhabited, even though it is still very early in the breeding season. Jack from MBC and Kayden from Rai were so interested they stayed on another hour to help Ted check all 108 boxes and record all the results. Jack was even granted the privilege of holding one of the birds – and was rewarded with a sharp peck!

Walking back to the car park was another adventure as we had to negotiate our way over rocks between seals. The tide was well out but there were a lot of seals enjoying the sun and some of them didn't appreciate us interrupting their nap! All our efforts were rewarded by a delicious meal prepared for us by the Kaikoura Seaward Lions. Sunday morning started early with a fire alarm forcing many to hurry outside still in their pyjamas while the Kaikoura Volunteer Fire Brigade checked all the rooms and declared it a false alarm. It wasn't me burning my toast! After breakfast and packing up we headed to the mini golf and were just finishing our game when the rain started so we went to Kaikoura's excellent museum, spending an hour or so browsing before it was time to meet up and eat our packed lunches in the theatre's upstairs room. While there, Nicky McArthur talked to us about the Hutton's Shearwater colony on her mountainside property and how she'd initiated the dark sky project in Kaikoura to try and stop the birds from being attracted to land on the formerly brightly lit roads where they were often killed by cars.

All in all, an amazing weekend of fun, fellowship and service. (Debby)

Lap the Map for Diabetes

This World Diabetes Month, November, we are calling all New Zealanders to 'Lap the Map' for diabetes prevention.



Can you help us walk a combined distance surpassing the perimeter of the New Zealand coastline (15,000km).

Lions Clubs across the country will be hosting family friendly walks and community events to promote a healthy lifestyle and raise awareness of diabetes in New Zealand.

It doesn't matter how far you walk or run, it's about being involved, getting active and moving together.

All funds raised will go towards diabetes awareness, prevention and research.

Diabetes New Zealand tell us New Zealand has a serious and growing type 2 diabetes problem.

It is predicted that within the next 20 years, the number of people with type 2 diabetes will increase by 70-90%. Of these people Māori, Pacific and Asian will be worst affected. Allowing this to occur will have a hugely detrimental impact on the wellbeing of our people, but also on the sustainability of our health system and economy.

At a population level, it is essential to create an environment which is conducive to healthy food and activity choices in order to reduce the high rates of obesity, the major preventative risk factor for type 2 diabetes. At a community level, there is a need to support our whānau and communities to make positive change. At an individual level, diabetes affects almost every aspect of a person's life, including their physical health, mental health, social life and employment.

Diabetes is the tip of the iceberg as the cause of significant health issues with downstream comorbidities – cardiovascular disease, stroke, kidney failure, vision loss neuropathies and lower limb amputation. In New Zealand, 17% of all health loss across the population is the result of diabetes.

All fish are released back into the water. "Since then (2012) it's just grown and grown from 10 rods up to 42 now." According to club data the Club has conducted 93 clinics for 806 young kids supported by 224 parent/guardians plus 298 special needs clients and 80 carers.

Australia has 25,000 Lions in 1200 clubs, and this year the Esperance Lions youth fishing clinic was judged most innovative club project,

first for WA and then for Australia.




Youth Science Fair - Blenheim Lions Club

Life Demands More Than Just Catching!

There's a quote by Maya Angeleu that I have come across and has lingered in my mind: "I've learnt that you shouldn't go through life with a catcher's mitt on both hands; you need to be able to throw something back." Like so much of Angelou's wisdom, it sounds simple - almost a play on words - but it reveals a deeper truth about the kind of life worth living.



In an age defined by constant squander - selfishness, entertainment, even talking about relationships - how many of us go through life with both hands out, always ready to receive. We absorb, we take, we accumulate. And yet, the world doesn't change just because we've caught something. It changes when we throw something back - when we contribute, challenge, create, or give.

To throw something back is to engage. It means speaking up in a meeting instead of nodding along. It means mentoring someone who reminds you of yourself. It means giving time, offering love, sharing knowledge, or standing up when silence is easier. It's the difference between living passively and participating actively in your own story. Throwing something back doesn't have to be grand. It can be the smallest of gestures: a word of encouragement, a genuine apology, a meal shared. It's about recognizing that the gift of life isn't just in what we're given - it's in what we return to the world.

We all start with the mitts on. As children, we're meant to receive: care, education, support. But as we grow, life expects more than just catching. The question is: What are you throwing back?

A world full of catchers quickly becomes lifeless. Progress happens when someone dares to throw, to risk, to give. So take off one of those mitts. Step up. Speak out. Pass something on. It's certainly spurred me to do more.

Because life isn't meant to be a spectator sport - it's meant to be a give-and-take game. It's our turn to throw something back.

When I was looking for a closing thought, Maya Angeleu came to mind - Maya Angelou is one of the United States' most interesting and important people. Born in 1928, she worked just about every job you could imagine but became best known as a writer; books, plays, films and more.

She was active during the Civil Rights Movement and remained an activist for racial equality, gender equality, and social justice. Her work has won countless awards, and in 2011, she was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom. She passed away in 2014 at age 86, but her words live on.


